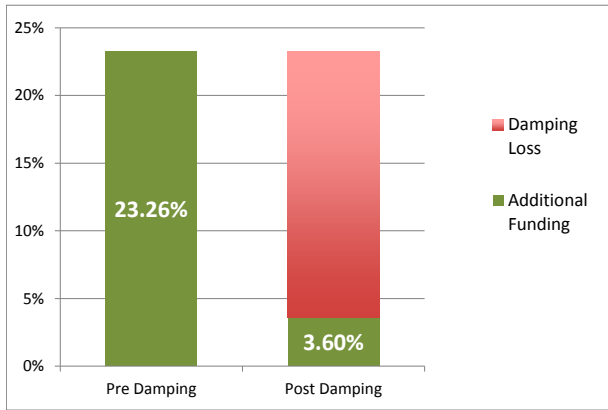

**Changes to funding attributable to Rural Services Technical Adjustments - Pre and Post Damping**

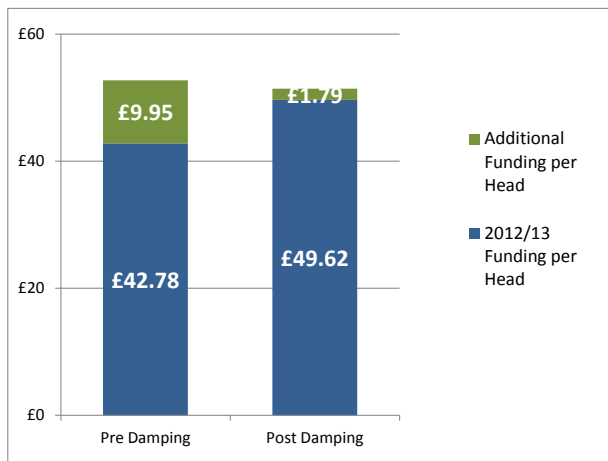


**South Norfolk Exemplifications Data**

The graph and table show that South Norfolk would have had a pre-damping 23.26% increase in funding if the rural services adjustment had been implemented in 2012/13. However, damping would have reduced that gain arising from the rural service technical adjustment to 3.6%. Consequently, damping reduces the impact of the rural services technical adjustment by 82% for South Norfolk.

**Impact of the changes attributable to Rural Services Technical Adjustments on Funding - Pre and Post Damping**

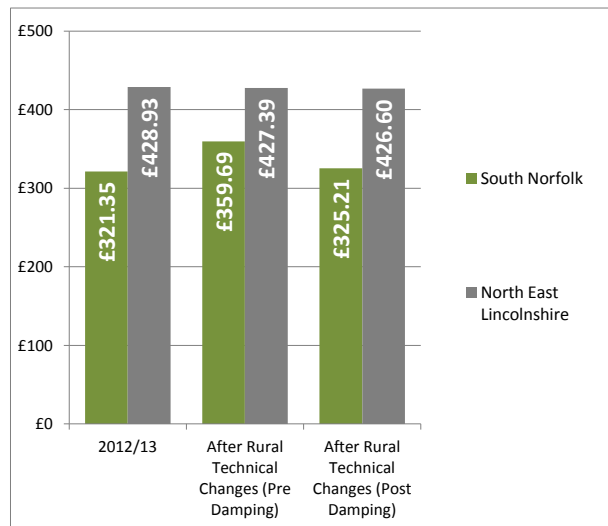


The impact of the **positive** rural services technical adjustment and the subsequent **negative** impact of damping can be seen in this graph.

The pre-damping impact for South Norfolk is a funding gain of £9.95 per head. For this reason, we feel that it is important that South Norfolk supports the rural services technical adjustment in the consultation.

However, the post-damping impact for South Norfolk is a much reduced funding gain of £1.79 per head. For this reason, SPARSE Rural have called on the Government to find a way of ensuring that a greater proportion of the pre-damping gains arising from the rural services technical adjustment are realised as cash funding.

**Comparison of Impact of Technical Changes - South Norfolk v North East Lincolnshire**

To provide a comparison, in two tier areas, County and District funding has been added together. So, in order to be comparable with North East Lincolnshire which is a unitary authority South Norfolk's funding per head has been added to that of Norfolk County Council.

In 2012/13, South Norfolk received £107.58 less funding per head than North East Lincolnshire.

Prior to damping, the gains attributable to the rural services technical adjustment would have resulted in a closing of the gap between North East Lincolnshire and South Norfolk to £67.7 per head. This is a significant improvement for rural areas and SPARSE Rural has welcomed the changes in the recent Business Rates consultation.

As shown above, the damping block significantly reduces the gains arising from the rural services technical adjustment. After damping the gap in funding between North East Lincolnshire and South Norfolk increases to £101.39 per head.
