We asked you what changed for you over the course of the conference?

- Prior to the conference you thought that the most significant challenge facing rural communities was public transport....after you thought it was local government funding
- Access to health facilities increased most significantly for you as the issue which was the biggest rural challenge, and public transport decreased in importance for you

We asked you about resources...

- You thought that the rural issue given most resource or highest priority was broadband and mobile connectivity (no change)
- Both public transport and older people's services showed the greatest decrease in terms of perceived resource or priority given to those rural issues

We asked you where we should do more work...

...You said we should consider research into the following areas:

- Local government funding
- Rural economy
- Health facilities
- Older people's services
- Viable village services
