Background

A home for the Benedictine Monks maintaining the tradition and relics of St Cuthbert

- Building started 11 August 1093
- Main structure completed within 40 years
- Finally "Completed" in 1487 with the addition of the main (Crossing) Tower

A statement building

- A architectural match for the magnificent Romanesque churches being built in France
- Worthy of the great saint and the God he served
- A symbol of political and military power of the Prince Bishops

A centre of pilgrimage

- The shrine of St Cuthbert since 1104
- The foremost pilgrimage destination in England until 1170
- Remained a place of pilgrimage throughout the middle ages


A World Heritage Site

The Cathedral Today – A Regional Icon

- Durham Cathedral is one of the region's iconic buildings and one of the country's chief ecclesiastical centres:
 - The Cathedral attracts 612,000 visitors per year (2009 figures)
 - The Cathedral is the Seat of the Bishop of Durham and hosts major events
 - The Cathedral continues to attract those seeking spiritual refreshment or inspiration
