

Why Localism?

Viewed from the left:

- Hollowing out of the nation-state requires "double-devolution"
 - Upwards to supra-national bodies
 - Downwards to local
- Democratic deficit
 - Localism necessary to re-engage with voters
- Place-shaping paradigm
 - Neo-endogenous development
 - Community, place and identity



Why Localism?

Viewed from the <u>right</u>:

- Anti-statist, anti-interventionist
 - Remove state controls/ targets
 - Marketisation and competition
 - Atomised local actors
- Rolling back the state
 - Reduce size of central government and its agencies (and local state?)
- Place-shaping paradigm
 - Means of mobilising civil society,
 voluntary action and philanthropy to
 take over state functions



Localism in an era of austerity

- Localism Act
 - Neighbourhood planning
 - Community right to build
 - Community right to bid
 - Community right to challenge

What questions does past academic research suggest we should be asking about localism?

Governing through communities – The 1995 Rural White Paper

- Shifting boundaries between state and society
- Governing 'through community'
- Local people, local solutions, local problems
- Local decision making but government as enabler and stimulator.
- Criticisms: volunteers, limited investment

Government and Community in 2012

- From capacity building to 'barrier busting'
- Increasing expectations of the local authority, coordinating, supporting, integrating
- Scope for planning to be a "creative exercise" and a "collective enterprise"?



Bridging the gap?



- Project focus on the integration between strategic planning and 'very local' planning
- Little or no guidance on how decisions at very local and strategic levels might dovetail together
- Project involved 5 case studies. Main barriers
- Lack of resource at local authority level
- Reliance on a few people at v local level
- Limited appreciation of process at v local level
- Operational complexity of strategic planning

Prospects for bridging 'local' and 'very local'?

- Planning remains plan led, an activity done by local authorities to conform with national guidance and planning law
- Vacuum on how integration between local and neighbourhood plans will happen
- Is the NPPF a 'fudge', with its ambiguities left to be clarified by the courts?
 - eg. What exactly does the presumption in favour of sustainable development mean?

Pushing Power Your Way?



- How genuine is commitment to localism when LAs' budgets are cut by 31% over 5 years?
 - Or is this passing responsibility for the cuts to LAs?
- Will the Localism Act be successful?
 - Requirement to demonstrate consensus
 - ACRE criticism that referenda are divisive and destroy cohesion
 - Basis in concern for inclusion but shows naivety?
- Are there limits to localism?
